ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF THE AGORA GROUP

In the Agora Group, in line with the idea of sustainable development and adopted strategic lines of responsibility, we have been developing **natural environmental actions** for many years. These are both our internal campaigns for energy saving, waste segregation and change of everyday habits to greener ones, but also investing in buildings we manage and promoting or initiating pro-environmental media projects.

Taking into account the specific nature of the business and the industry, Agora has defined the core areas of direct impact. They include: **energy consumption**, **water consumption** and wastewater sewage production, material consumption, waste and recyclable materials management, consumption and production as well as building social awareness of climate change and pro-ecological attitudes.

In 2020, none of the Agora Group companies terminated their cooperation with any of the suppliers from the above-mentioned chain due to the negative impact of their activities on the environment.

The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Agora's environmental activities

Every year, we present data proving our efforts to reduce, incl. raw materials used or waste produced. However, due to the changes caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, i.e. the introduction of remote work and the freezing of the operations of a part of the business, the data on the environmental impact of Agora Group's businesses is unprecedented and not fully comparable in all areas with the previous results. This does not mean, however, that 2020 was not a time of intensive activities by Agora for the natural environment, as evidenced in this part of the Report.
